

Traveling to Arizona State University

This document is provided by Arizona State University to welcome you for the spring 2024 semester starting on Monday, Jan. 8, 2024. You have met the requirements to apply for and obtain a nonimmigrant student visa and therefore meet the eligibility requirements for entry into the U.S. As a carrier of this document, you are expected to enroll full-time at ASU, with the in-person requirement for classes as described on this link for international students.

As you plan your travel to the U.S., please print out this document and keep it with you in your carry-on bag. It may be useful when navigating immigration and customs at the airport when you arrive in the U.S.

What to do when you arrive in the U.S.:

- When the plane lands in the U.S., proceed to the immigration and customs checkpoint.
- Have all necessary documents ready to present to the officer.
- Complete all immigration and customs checkpoints.
 - If you experience any difficulties during the immigration and customs process, please call the ISSC emergency cell phone number at +1 480-647-4874.
- Once you have cleared the customs checkpoint, you will exit into the international arrivals area of
 the airport. If you need to catch a connecting flight to get to Phoenix, you will need to take your
 bags with you to the proper terminal or check-in counter for your domestic flight. At many airports,
 you may need to take a free inter-terminal shuttle to get to the proper gate. We highly recommend
 visiting the website of your arrival airport to prepare for what you will need to do.

What to have in your carry-on bags:

- Have all travel documents in your carry-on bags where you can easily access them, including your passport, visa, I-20 or DS-2019, SEVIS I-901 fee payment receipt, proof of funding documents, and your ASU admission letter.
 - **Please note:** You MUST print your I-20. You cannot have it on your phone. Your travel documents should not be laminated or altered in any way.

What to expect at U.S. airports:

- At your Port of Entry, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officers will check your documents.
- While a CBP officer inspects your documents, you may be asked some general questions. We
 encourage you to remain calm as questions are a normal, routine procedure. Always answer
 questions clearly, honestly and politely.
- There is no cause for alarm if you are asked to step into a side room for a <u>secondary inspection</u>.
 They may need to ask you some questions or verify some information. You are allowed to ask the officer what the issue is, but we recommend you do so respectfully.
